Someone is needed to organize the auction, silent auction, and sign in sheet. Will bring this up again in June. Welcome bags are needed. Carey Dack made the welcome bags last year. June 27th, 2010 Koopman Farm

In attendance: Bill and Heather Roberts, Kathy Williams, Katrina Sullivan, Ron and Carla Slabaugh, Chuck Strong and Gail Fleming, Steve and Hejin Hanna, Bruce and Cathy Dickey, Mike and Sheila Wald, Diane Nelson, and Bob Doyle.

Meeting called to order at 12:25 pm.

Treasurer's report (Gail Fleming): Net loss \$523. We do not have the money from the hunt test or from the trophies.

Old Business:

Hunt test: We are looking at a profit of between \$300 and \$450. Steve motioned to give the \$25 gift card that was for the gunner that was fired, to Sue Orlicky. Mike seconded. All were in favor. Motion was approved. Steve suggested that it would not be any more work to do a two day hunt test next year as it was for a one day hunt test this year. Steve motioned for 25 percent of the profits from the hunt test goes to hunt test equipment. Bruce seconded. All were in favor. Motion was approved. Equipment that we need are bird crates and bird bags. The August meeting would be a good time to make a decision on the weekend for the hunt test next year so that we can get an earlier start. Gail suggested that the chairs from this hunt test write down what they did and what was good to do and pass that on to the next chairs.

Specialty: Bob and Diane Anderson, the chairs for the specialty will not be able to attend. Mike and Sheila will do the lunches and gifts for the judges, and will grill for the party after the specialty. The theme is Bow Wow Luau. The specialty is August 20th. Rainier Sporting Dog Association is August 19th and Olympic Kennel Club is August 21st and 22nd. Parking to camp together needs to be sent in together. We are \$385 short of breaking even on the trophies. We are down on donations this year. 1st place trophies are pushing us into the hole. We will talk about this at the August meeting regarding if we want to drop the 1st place trophies. Sheila is donating all of the trophies for the supported entries saving the club \$150 on trophies. We will have a live and a silent auction. Mike is going to do the auction. The menu for the luau is smoked pork, glazed salmon, and huli-huli chicken.

Steve Hanna and Hejin Hahn: Qualifying Master Hunter Score Saturday with Tosci

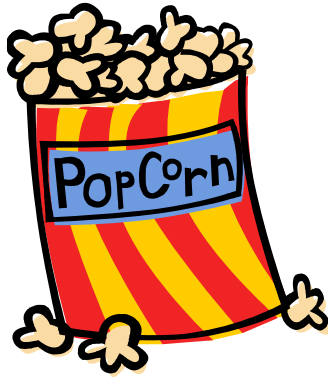
Chuck Strong and Gail Fleming: Qualifying Junior Hunter Score Sunday with Cayenne

Flash: The story of a wild child!

Flash was so wild as a puppy that he spent more time in the cage than I would have liked, simply because I did not know what to do with him. He was unlike any other dog I ever had. He was my first male Vizsla. At the time I decided to keep Flash, I had raised two Vizsla girls from puppies, Minnie and Gigi. Minnie was my first purebred dog and was the first dog I put any training on. Minnie earned her conformation championship, companion dog and junior hunter titles. I thought I knew something about dogs after I trained her. Gigi was fairly easy to train, too, but did not like to show or compete, so did not achieve the success that Minnie did. Flash taught me on a regular basis that I knew almost nothing about training dogs.

Flash was exuberant! He was the happiest dog I have ever been around, which made him tremendous fun to be with, even when he was misbehaving. Flash was busy as a puppy and continued to be busy throughout his life. He was not hyper, though. He was busy with a purpose. He wanted to check everything out and see what was going on. One of his favorite things was to run from one end of the house to the other, which he did regularly his entire life. He had things to do, but he was not destructive. He did not destroy a thing in his life, including his toys. He was very gentle and careful with his toys. He was also careful about what he touched with his mouth. If his favorite ring toy landed in the mud, he would gingerly pull it out and bring it to me so that we could continue to play.

Flash knew what I wanted him to do, but had his own ideas of what should happen. For the first several years we showed in agility, if I did not cue him soon enough, which I frequently did not, he would make his own decision about which obstacle or series of obstacles to take next. Sometime he chose the correct obstacle, but often he did not. In his early years in obedience class, he would bounce around on the end of the leash, having lots of fun doing his own thing, completely blowing me off. He severely tried my patience. We probably should have discontinued showing in agility until I understood better how to run a course and Flash developed some impulse control, but I liked going to trials so much that I did not want to give it up. Our progress was slow, but we kept with it.

I began to read up on agility and what to do with an out of control dog. One of the best things we did was go to Power Paws Agility Camp. There, I learned two important things from Nancy Gyes: 1. I needed to get Flash toy motivated, and 2. I needed to read Clean Run magazine. After I started reading Clean Run magazine, I started paying a whole lot more attention to how people at the excellent agility level were running their dogs. I started asking questions of the people who I wanted to copy. That led me to start training with Jill Crawford at Argus. I learned techniques from Jill that I would never have picked up on my own. Flash and I started improving as a team immediately.

Even though Flash was wild, I really enjoyed the time we spent doing things together. Flash earned his conformation championship and his companion dog excellent, novice rally, excellent standard agility and master excellent jumpers agility titles. Dee, my partner, and I took Flash to Vizsla Nationals in Prescott, Arizona, in 2002, to Fort Worth, Texas, in 2004, to Bakersfield, California, in 2005, and to Tucson, Arizona, in 2008. We also took him to Power Paws Agility Camp in Paso Robles, California, in 2006. We had a wonderful time traveling with Flash and seeing the countryside.

It seems like each of my dogs has had their favorite food or food related activity. Minnie liked to blow air into the water while fishing pieces of kibble out of the water bowl. I called it "snorkeling." Gigi loved berries and looked forward to getting berries as a special evening treat. Flash loved popcorn! Whenever he heard us opening a bag of popcorn, he would race into the kitchen to get some. We like to eat popcorn as a snack on the weekends. We sit on the couch and throw pieces of popcorn out to the dogs. Flash was a maniac for catching popcorn, wherever it was thrown. He loved to run back and forth across the living room, catching popcorn. Snack time is a lot less exciting without him.

Flash would have been 9 years old on August 7. On a Sunday evening in early January, he had what looked like a seizure, except that his eyes were not dilated. He started stumbling around, falling into the walls and furniture. We took him to the vet, who initially could not tell us what was wrong. A few days later, Flash had another such episode. We had an ultrasound done and found that he had tumors in his spleen and that at least two of them burst, causing the seizure-like episodes. Our choices were to remove the spleen or to keep enduring the bursting tumors, with the understanding that he would eventually bleed to death from a bursting tumor. We chose to remove the spleen. The veterinary oncologist said that there was a 50% chance the tumors were benign. We liked those odds, but ended up on the wrong end of the 50% - the tumors were sarcomas. Flash recovered so well from the surgery that I had high hopes for his complete recovery, despite what the oncologist said. At the end of March, Flash and I started doing a little agility training together. After that, he started to lose energy and we had to put him to sleep in May. Dee and I are glad that we opted for the surgery, as the recovery time was short and it gave us four good months with our dog.

We miss Flash. Flash taught me a few things about dog training. I now feel more prepared for the next wild one. In the meantime, we adopted Shy from the NW Vizsla Rescue. Shy is just two months older than Flash was. Shy is a completely different type of dog, but I am sure we will learn from him, too.

With summer in full swing, here are some thoughts about keeping your Vizsla cool and safe. Most of us know it is not safe to leave our pets in a car on a hot day even with the windows open, but even on a cool day (mid-60's) the temperature in a closed car can rise to 130 F in minutes. Death can occur within 15 minutes.

Make sure your Vizsla has adequate water and shade at all times, limit time outside in hot weather. Make sure your home is cool on warm days; install temperature alarms that call your cell phone.

Monitor your Vizsla carefully when outside in warm weather, frantic panting, extreme salivation, labored breathing and bright red gums are clear warnings of overheating, get him to a cool place, use a fan and wipe the face and muzzle with cool water and get to your vet immediately. Don't give ice or use ice water.

Don't exercise on hot humid days; even water play can cause overheating if the water is warm. Enjoy your summer and come join us for the specialty, it's a party man! Sheila


