
There will be no service or viewing, but her family would like everyone to know that their door is always open and all are welcome to come have a drink in Hemi Doobles memory.



Emergency Field First-Aid for Bird Dogs

Being prepared for field emergencies is equally important to having a properly conditioned bird dog. Luckily, most injuries a dog incurs can be readily treated in the field, but knowing how to handle a more serious accident could make a difference in the prognosis for your dog. It's important to know your dog well and be able to readily recognize the signs of something wrong.

"Traumatic injuries are the most common problems that occur in hunting dogs," says Joe Spoo, DVM, DACVSMR, a hunting dog specialist from Best Care Pet Hospital in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. "Your field outings likely won't involve more than a few minor nicks and scratches. However, if you run dogs long enough, you're bound to encounter a few major problems ranging from cuts and bruises to penetrating, life-threatening injuries. It is in these times that preparation and levelheadedness can determine whether your hunting partner will be able to hunt with you another day."

Conducting a tailgate exam is a surefire way to help keep your dog healthy and safe in the field. Take time at the end of each run, and definitely at the end of every day afield, to go over your dog from nose to tail, looking for any abnormality, injury or area of concern.

"Address any issues right away because they won't magically disappear when you put your dog in the crate," Dr. Spoo advises. "A dog's immediate injuries should be treated and then taken as quickly as possible to a veterinarian. Dealing with them in the moment can often mean the difference between days, weeks and months of recovery. The goal is to get your dog healthy again and then back into the field as soon as possible — this is what he or she lives for."


A good first-aid kit is a necessity in order to properly care for wounds in the field. Dr. Spoo says, "The key to preventing further pain and complications is to stabilize the injury until a more definitive treatment can be performed by a veterinarian."

Continued...Emergency Field First-Aid for Bird Dogs

Dr. Spoo recommends a simple first-aid kit complete with these essentials:

- Digital thermometer for monitoring your dog's temperature and avoiding heat stroke
- Surgical soap to wash and disinfect hands before performing first aid
- 4-inch-x-4-inch gauze sponges to help stop bleeding
- 2-inch vet wrap for wrapping injured legs
- 1-inch tape for securing bandages
- Triple antibiotic ointment for superficial injuries
- Cotton swabs for cleaning and applying ointments
- Staple gun for temporarily closing up wounds
- Tissue glue & EMT gel to help reduce bleeding, diminish pain and itching, and protect the wound from further infection
- Needlenose pliers for removing splinters or items lodged in the mouth or throat
- Hemostats for removing ticks or items lodged in paw pads
- Clean white T-shirt for packing or wrapping large wounds
- Saline solution for washing irritated eyes
- Ophthalmic ointment to help reduce or prevent eye infections
- 50 percent dextrose or sugar solution for low blood sugar
- **Hydrogen peroxide or apomorphine** to induce vomiting if your dog eats something toxic
- Any medications prescribed or recommended by your veterinarian for inflammation, nausea or diarrhea
- Contact information for your veterinarian and/or a veterinarian who can treat sporting dogs near the area in which you are hunting, trialing or training



"Learn how to assess and address," Dr. Spoo advises. "If you can wash, clean and staple the wound yourself, you can accelerate the healing process while seeking veterinary care."

Care for lacerations depends on the severity of the injury, but generally, you should apply pressure and get your dog to the veterinarian so the injury can be cleaned up and stitched. Most cuts are inconsequential if cared for, but sometimes a dog may have tendon or nerve damage.

An eye abrasion has occurred if a dog has a red, inflamed eye, which requires immediate veterinary attention. Seeds trapped in the eye could be the underlying issue, or a dog could have an abrasion or more serious puncture or laceration to the cornea.

Some dogs can have an allergic reaction to insect bites or stings from a bee, wasp or horsefly. In the instance the reaction is severe, it's a good idea to carry an antihistamine with you to treat the bite or sting if you cannot seek immediate veterinary care.

When a dog is outdoors, whether on land or in water, he or she potentially could be in danger of a snake encounter, depending on your geographic location and time of the year. Being aware of the types of snakes native to areas you are traveling to hunt of field trial is imperative. Many variables — including the amount of venom injected, location of the bite, size of the dog, and elapsed time between the dog being bitten and the arrival at a veterinary facility — impact the severity and outcome of a snakebite.

If you suspect your dog has been bitten by a snake, it is crucial to seek veterinary care. Do not apply ice or heat to the wound, nor should you attempt to cut into the wound and suck out the venom or apply a bandage to the wound. Restrain your dog as much as possible and keep him or her calm to help slow the spread of venom until you can get him or her to the veterinarian.

Being prepared to provide aid for an injured bird dog is the best course. Thinking ahead and being aware of how to handle potential problems will go a long way in making a difference in the outcome.

Are There Behavior Changes When Dogs Are Spayed or Neutered?

Spaying or neutering dogs can cause unexpected and unwanted behavior changes.

According to two large sample investigations, there appear to be some surprising and undesirable behavior changes in dogs who are spayed or neutered.

If you believe many of the websites maintained by a number of humane societies and veterinary groups, spaying and neutering of dogs seems to be a solution for many behavioral problems. Some of these websites will even talk about "The Responsibility of Spaying and Neutering Dogs." A sample of the statements which I found on these sites include:

- "Spaying and neutering makes pets better, more affectionate companions."
- "Your dog should be spayed or neutered because sex hormones lead to unnecessary stress and aggression among dogs."
- "Unsterilized animals often exhibit more behavior and temperament problems than do those who have been spayed or neutered."
- "Many aggression problems may be avoided by early neutering."
- "Female dogs, like males, have an increased risk of aggression if left intact."
- "Male dogs display hormonally influenced aggression toward each other. Neutering eliminates much of this behavior."

My interest in the question of possible behavior changes associated with spaying and neutering was rekindled when I had a pair of European visitors who were quite amazed at the number of dogs in North America who were spayed or neutered. According to them the idea that dog should be neutered in order to control certain behavior tendencies seems to be a uniquely North American notion. Apparently Europeans don't buy into this idea. A Swedish study found that 99 percent of the dogs in their sample were not neutered. A Hungarian study showed 57 percent intact dogs, and a British survey found 46 percent intact dogs. In fact it is against the law to neuter dogs in Norway unless there is a specific medical reason.

The vast majority of the research done on spaying and neutering has focused on medical issues, such as the reduction of the incidence of certain cancers and hormonally related diseases and canine population control. However, since my interests focus on behavior these gave me little insight. Ultimately my search of the scientific literature uncovered two studies that appeared to be soundly designed, which used similar methodology, collected data from a large number of dogs, and directly addressed the issue of behavior changes as a result of spaying and neutering. To be honest I found that their results to be surprising and somewhat shocking.

The first of these studies was reported by Deborah Duffy and James Serpell, both at the School of Veterinary Medicine at the University of Pennsylvania. It was published in The Proceedings of the Third International Symposium on Nonsurgical Contraceptive Methods for Pet Population Control*. The second was a master's thesis at Hunter College in New York which was submitted by Parvene Farhoody**. Both of these studies used the Canine Behavioral Assessment and Research Questionnaire (usually abbreviated as the C-BARQ) which was developed by Serpell and hisassociates. It is a long questionnaire, involving 101 items, and it has been shown to be a valid and reliable way of testing various aspects of canine aggression, fear and anxiety, attachment, excitability, energy level and other factors. It is based upon owners directly reporting the occurrence or non-occurrence of specific behaviors in their dogs in a structured way.

Continued...Are There Behavior Changes When Dogs Are Spayed or Neutered?

The number of dogs tested in these two studies is quite large. The Duffy and Serpell study tested two different samples, one of 1,552 dogs and the other of 3,593 dogs. The Farhoody study tested 10,839 dogs, thus the combined studies provide data on 15,984 dogs in total, making this an amazingly powerful data set.

There are too many measures for me to report in detail, however the main results were the same across all three samples of dogs. Given that one of the accepted behavioral reasons for spaying and neutering is to reduce aggression, the distressing results of these studies is that spayed and neutered dogs actually show considerably more aggression. Depending upon the specific form of aggression (owner directed, stranger directed etc.) the size of these effects is quite large, varying from a low of around a 20 percent increase to more than double the level of aggression in the neutered dogs as measured by the C-BARQ scoring scale. A further surprise was that these effects were similar for both males and females. One slight difference between males and females is that for male dogs the age at which they are neutered makes no difference in the increase of aggression relative to intact dogs, however for females early spaying (before the dog is one year of age) causes a considerably larger increase in aggression relative to later spaying.

A different worrisome finding is that there was a roughly 31 percent increase in fearfulness for both sexes. This is accompanied by a 33 percent increase in touch sensitivity. The spayed and neutered dogs also showed a roughly 8 percent increase in excitability. About the only positive effect on behavior that seems to result from spaying and neutering is the roughly 68 percent decrease in urine marking.

I must admit that I was astonished and greatly bothered by the direction of these results. Farhoody summarizes her findings saying "Our data showed that the behavior of neutered dogs was significantly different from that of intact dogs in ways that contradict the prevailing view. Among the findings, neutered dogs were more aggressive, fearful, excitable, and less trainable than intact dogs."

Considering the fact that one of the reasons recommended for spaying and neutering dogs is to correct a range of canine behavior problems, Duffy and Serpell's conclusions expose this to be a myth when they say "For most behaviors, spaying/neutering was associated with worse behavior, contrary to conventional wisdom."

Perhaps on this count the Europeans have it right...

Just a week after his first birthday, Saylor completed his Grand Championship at the last west coast show of the year in Canada.


We headed down over the border the following weekend to the shows in Monroe. There, he took RWD at the Specialty and went on to take WD/BOW the following day for the 4 point major!



LET'S PLAY A GAME!!!

The Fabulous (and Inexpensive) Muffin Tin Game

I've been playing the muffin tin game with my dogs for more than ten years and my dogs and I still enjoy it. It uses two of the dog's senses – sight and smell – and challenges his brain. This game is perfect for puppies, adult dogs, and even geriatric dogs. It's also good for your relationship because you're setting up the game, encouraging him as he plays it, and you're his biggest fan when he succeeds.

Setting Up the Game

This game needs a few parts to play it, but thankfully they are inexpensive. First, find a muffin tin that is made for regular sized muffins. A twelve muffin tin is best as it gives the dog more chances to play. If you only have a six muffin tin, that's okay to start.

You'll also need one tennis ball for each hole in the tin. So, find twelve tennis balls for the twelve muffin tin or six for the smaller baking pan.

Then you need some good treats. For this game, smelly treats are best, especially when first teaching the game. Swiss cheese works great or some meat. Cut the treats in small pieces; about the size of a pencil eraser is perfect.

The Game

To set up the game, place a treat in each hole of the muffin tin and then place a tennis ball on top of the treat. For standard size muffin tins, the tennis ball fits perfectly. The goal of the game is to encourage your dog to sniff for the treats and try to dislodge the tennis ball so he can get the treat.



Once the muffin tin is set up, place it on the floor and encourage your dog to check it out. You may have to slightly lift a ball so he can see and sniff the hidden treat. When he sees and smells it, drop the ball again and encourage him to find the treat. When he finds it, praise him!

Bold, food-motivated dogs will learn this game quickly and will send tennis balls flying. Other dogs may need more encouragement, but that's okay. Remember, it's important that you play the game with your dog, so talk to him, show him where the treats are, and if needed, lift a tennis ball now and then.

One of the mental challenges of this game is for the dog to remember where he's found treats and where he hasn't. This is especially true if he rolls the tennis balls from one hole to another. Don't make it too easy by lifting the balls out yourself; let your dog figure it out.

When your dog has found all the treats, set up the game and play it again. If you use small treats, playing it twice a couple of times a week won't upset his normal diet.
