COVID-19 Dog Sports GENERAL Guidelines



Suggested Best Practices for the Well-Being of Dog Sport Participants

The AKC supports each club's informed decision to reschedule, postpone or cancel their respective events, as well as supporting clubs ready to hold events in locations that are open and permit gatherings. As

events resume across the country, people need to feel safe while enjoying their dog activities. The AKC urges clubs to take appropriate precautions for the benefit of their participants. Events need to be held in a manner that emphasizes the safety of participants and event officials over efficiency.

The following is a list of suggested best practices that may be helpful when planning or attending an event. Event locations, facilities and dates will differ. With a situation that is continually evolving, it is up to the clubs to determine the guidelines that best fit their event. In order to inform participants, specific guidelines established by the club should be published in the premium, club website and posted on signage/flyers at their event.

General Practices

- 1. Clubs, officials and participants are required to follow State and local guidelines that apply to the area where the event is held.
- 2. Practice social distancing consistent with current guidelines. Avoid congregating to the extent possible.
- 3. Consider wearing masks when in close proximity to others. Clubs should provide masks if desired for officials, judges and volunteers.
- 4. Consider wearing disposable or washable gloves.
- 5. Have plenty of hand sanitizers placed for people to use.
- 6. Wash hands as frequently as possible. Have disinfecting spray at bathroom facilities for people to spray door handles (or anything else they touch).
- 7. If you utilize portable toilets, please ask for a hand washing station to be delivered as well.
- 8. Avoid shaking hands or hugging.
- 9. Avoid touching dogs that are not your responsibility.
- 10. Avoid common use pens/pencils bring your own.
- 11. Disinfect surfaces in common use areas as often as possible (tables, chairs, doorknobs, etc.) Clubs and facilities may consider not providing chairs.
- 12. Meals No potlucks. Avoid or stagger group lunches/dinners if possible. It is recommended that club supply boxed lunches for judges and volunteers. Hospitality areas should avoid community items such as salt and pepper shakers, condiments, creamers, etc. Participants should consider bringing their own lunches/drinks.
- 13. Parking areas Park with increased distance between vehicles if possible. This is especially critical if handlers are required to crate from their vehicles.


It's the Pip and Kitty Show!

Budding Scientist: 11-year-old Tatum Duvall Investigates Salmonella in Vizsla Saliva

At just nine years old Tatum Duvall was catapulted into dog sports when her mom, Tanya Duvall, broke her leg. She began showing Vizslas as a Junior Handler and quickly fell in love with the sport.

"When my mom got hurt, I didn't expect to love dogs so much and showing so much," said Tatum.

Two years later, Tatum is a champion in the show ring.

Growing through Junior Showmanship

Even though the Colorado youth has only been a handler for a few years, Tatum and her dog Gambol have won several awards. Tatum has won Best in Show Owner-Handled, Best of Opposite Sex, and competed in The AKC National Owner-Handled Series.

Today, Tatum competes in Conformation, Junior Showmanship, Hunt Tests, Canine Good Citizen (CGC), Trick Dog, and Dock Diving. She loves Conformation the most because "it's really fun" and hunting because it gives her dogs the chance to follow their instincts.

"The thing I love most about being a Junior Handler is making friends with the other handlers and meeting juniors from all around the country," said Tatum.

Though Tatum has many accomplishments, it can be easy to forget she's only 11. When she's not showing dogs, she loves hanging out with them.

One of her favorite memories from handling her dog includes how Gambol gives it her all even when they're exhausted after a long day. At home, one of her favorite ways to spend time with her dogs is cuddling.

Gambol is now three years old and one of six Vizslas Tatum owns.

"Showing has allowed me to travel the country, to show many breeds, and just have a lot of fun," Tatum said.

Winning Science Fairs

In addition to being a Junior Handler, Tatum is a budding scientist. Tatum got the idea for her science fair project after speaking to her mom at a show about whether it's better to feed your dog a raw or cooked diet. She began investigating the prevalence of salmonella in the saliva of Vizsla dogs fed raw food versus cooked food.

"The reason I choose to do that was because your dog can cross-contaminate you and get you sick," Tatum said.





Tatum was the only sixth grader to compete in the middle school division of her regional science fair. She placed second, beating many 12-, 13-, and 14-year olds, and making it possible for her to be one of a select few to continue on to the state science fair.

Though the Colorado State Science Fair didn't happen inperson due to the <u>coronavirus</u>, the fair went virtual. Tatum presented virtually at the Colorado State Science Fair and placed second in the state middle school division for Animal Science.

"We are so very proud of her, as a sixth-grader, for her first state competition, against a tough group of 6th, 7th, and 8th graders!" said mom Tanya Duvall.

"The biggest thing I've learned from my project is that your dog can get salmonella from more than just their food," Tatum said. "It can come from them playing in the soil and ingesting it. It can come from unwashed fruits and vegetables. It can come from a lot of things other than their food."

Tatum plans to expand her research by testing for more pathogens and other health issues specific to Vizslas. In the future, Tatum will test Vizslas' food bowls and food as well as their environment and owners.

Advice for Other Juniors

Though Tatum is young, her experience has given her the opportunity to discover a deeper love of dogs and develop skills that can be used both in and out of the ring. Tatum recommends that other young people wanting to be Junior Handlers begin by finding a dog they love.

"I think being positive and having a bond with your dog and a love for the breed can really help in handling your dog," said Tatum. "Find a dog that you love and just keep going."



Want to Get Involved?

The AKC Juniors program offers children under 18 an opportunity to develop their handling skills and learn about good sportsmanship, dogs, and dog shows.

Juniors are eligible to compete in Showmanship, Obedience, Agility, Rally, Tracking, Hunt Tests, Herding, Field Trials, Earthdog, Lure Coursing, Coursing Ability, and Coonhound Events. There is no minimum age requirement for sports other than Showmanship (where you must be nine).

If your child is interested in becoming an AKC Junior Handler, the first step is to watch a show and <u>sign up for a class</u>. Juniors under 18 years old can sign up for a <u>Junior Handler number</u> here. This number will be used to track their participation in AKC sports and classes.

Except in Junior Showmanship, Juniors will exhibit in the regular classes and in the field along with all other exhibitors at the trials and tests, where they can obtain the same titles on their dogs and awards as adult handlers if they qualify.

Dogs sniff out coronavirus 'far better than machines or tests'

Can man's historic best friend help in the fight against man's current greatest enemy? Research teams around the world are taking advantage of dogs' remarkable sense of smell to train them to detect the presence of the coronavirus.

At the University of Helsinki, researchers believe that the sniffer dogs Kössi and Lucky may prove to be faster and more accurate detectors of SARS-CoV-2, the virus that causes COVID-19, than any other currently available method. Using urine samples collected from patients across Finland, the research team has trained the dogs to differentiate between positive and negative samples. More encouragingly, the dogs also appear to be able to detect the presence of COVID-19 before patients display any signs of illness.

Anna Hielm-Björkman, an associate professor of animal clinical research at the university, said that her team has collected urine samples from family members of COVID patients that had not yet been tested or had previously tested negative. In many cases, the dogs picked up on the presence of the disease and when researchers then asked those family members to submit to traditional tests, they were confirmed as positive.

"We found that the dogs could see that a person was getting sick about four to five days before they got the disease. That was really encouraging because it means that the sensitivity of the dogs is better than the tests," Hielm-Björkman said.

Current testing for COVID-19 typically gives results in two to three days, but the dogs are able to provide instant results. This is part of the reason that similar research projects are underway in the <u>United States</u>, <u>France</u>, <u>Germany</u>, Switzerland and Japan. The United Kingdom government recently announced a US\$549,000 grant to <u>fund a study on COVID-sniffing dogs</u> by Durham University, the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine and the charity Medical Detection Dogs.

A research project at the University of Pennsylvania's School of Veterinary Medicine (Penn Vet) that is training dogs to detect COVID-19 positive saliva and urine is expected to <u>begin preliminary screening on live human subjects as early as</u> July.

Putting 'pee-mail' skills to good work

The reason the dogs are so good at sniffing out the presence of the virus is, of course, their remarkable sense of smell. While dogs' habit of sniffing everything they pass can be maddening to the humans accompanying them on their walks, this processing of "reading their pee-mails," as Hielm-Björkman put it, yields all sorts of information and allows them to identify certain smells. Detection dogs can be trained to sniff out anything from mold to illicit drugs or missing persons. With the right training, they can also detect the presence of the source of the greatest pandemic in living history.

"The sense of smell that dogs have is millions or even billions times better than the machines that are used to look for molecules. The dogs can find molecules in very, very small concentration. For example if you had a glass of water containing between one and 100 molecules of whatever you're looking for, a dog could find it, whereas the best types of machine detection systems would need 18 million molecules," Hielm-Björkman said.

Hielm-Björkman stressed that additional research needs to confirm whether the dogs are specifically detecting SARS-CoV-2 rather than the presence of another virus, but said preliminary results are very promising. In recent days, her team presented urine samples from patients who had non-coronavirus related illnesses like asthma and bronchitis and the dogs did not react. This leads her to believe that after additional testing, the specificity question will soon be settled.

The Helsinki dogs used in the COVID detection program were selected from a roster of cancer detection dogs that Hielm-Björkman's team has been working with for the past four to five years. Because of the novelty of the coronavirus, they did not want to put dogs or their handlers into any kind of unnecessary danger. Lucky and Kössi were selected because they are the dogs of a member of the research team. In Kössi's case, an exhibited talent for sniffing out illness was also a decisive factor. Originally found abandoned in a cardboard box along the highway in Malaga, Spain, Kössi was taken to a shelter and eventually adopted and brought home to Finland. As a puppy, the Galgo mix showed an unusual interest in the mouths of a dog and cat he lived with, leading his handler to have them checked for cancer. Both were positive.



International effort

While Kössi's journey is a remarkable one, Hielm-Björkman said that "any dog in any country could be trained to do the same thing." Provided that they're motivated to work for treats, that is.

Her team in Helsinki has been in close contact with their counterparts in Pennsylvania and the UK and she said everyone involved in this research sees amazing potential for using dogs to help in the fight against COVID-19 and future pandemics. Of the 500 or so professional detection dogs in Finland, she estimates that around 50 could be working as COVID sniffers by the fall, looking for the presence of coronavirus at border crossings and in concentrated living facilities like nursing homes. Because dogs can provide nearly instant results, they could also keep essential workers out of unnecessary quarantines.

Somewhat surprisingly, Hielm-Björkman pointed to financial savings as one of the main reasons to use detection dogs. "When you think about how much money each and every country has now used to combat and control COVID, it's crazy to think how different the world would look if we would have had those dogs. But it's never too late to start a good thing, so I just hope that governmental bodies and funders can see the potential in this," she said, adding that a comprehensive dog detection training program could cost as little as US\$1.1 million.

"I think that when we get the first published, peer-reviewed data that shows that this really works and that dogs are actually far better than the machines and tests that are currently available, then I think that governments will start getting interested," she added.
